#### **BOWLING CLUB TOUR 2019**

I will be taking my 2019 club tour to my home county of Norfolk, from Friday 23<sup>th</sup> to Tuesday the 27<sup>th</sup> August 2019 and we will be travelling with Mervyn's Coaches.

We will be staying in the historic city of Norwich at the George Hotel, which is a three-star Best Western hotel situated just off Newmarket Road (A11), within walking distance of the city centre. There is also a bus stop within 50 yards of the hotel.

#### A Simples Life?

Avid followers of Aleksandr Orlov in the 'Compare the meercat.com' campaign will remember the book he wrote (allegedly!) called 'A Simples Life'. Well, life for me was pretty simples, and pretty good even, when one morning last October I was doing a bit of gardening in the villa in Spain and the good lady we rent our apartment from said 'Trevor, have you seen a Doctor about that mole on your back?' and a voice (guess who?) echoed down from the other end of the villa 'I've been telling him that for months and he won't go!' This two-pronged attack made me think I ought to do something about it and I went online (marvellous thing this interweb) and made an appointment with my Doctor for as soon as we arrived back in the UK. A quick inspection, a quick referral and a few quick slices with a sharp knife removed a malignant melanoma, followed by a deeper cut as insurance, and with nothing spread to the lymph nodes all was declared cancer free and healthy.

At this same time, though, I began to suspect that life was not as simple as a meercat when I received a very painful visit from my old friends, the Haemorrhoids, and also an almost as painful hip when I put weight on it. Fast referrals from my Doctor on both, first to the Colorectal Department for a Colonoscopy, then to the Orthopaedic Department for the hip. How dead lucky am I, I thought, when the colonoscopy revealed a fist-sized polyp in my large colon, which would necessitate the removal of a fair bit of innards, but was benign and non-sinister, to have had two possible cancer scares one after the other and got away with both!

Meanwhile, my Orthopaedic Consultant, a lovely man, Mr Jamie Griffiths, who is also treating Coral for her hip problems, decided that I should have an emergency MRI scan and sent me to the new private Candover Clinic within the hospital grounds. Very nice and posh thought I as I hobbled out quickly past the credit card machine placed prominently on the receptionist desk!

Then, only three days later, not feeling too good and having a lay down, I heard the phone ring and Coral coming up the stairs. 'It's an Oncologist from the hospital', she said. Thoroughly puzzled I took the phone and heard the disembodied voice say 'Mr Wearn, I'm sorry to have to tell this over the phone but we've analyzed your MRI scan and you have advanced cancer in your spine and hip, can you please come to Basingstoke Hospital immediately, we may have to send you straight to Southampton for treatment'. I find it very difficult to describe my feelings after that hammerblow - numbness, devastation, complete disbelieve and I admit, time to shed a few tears. However, after a rush to the Hospital, the duty oncologist decided that the emergency could be downgraded, but, there I was on the cancer trail. With the knowledge that the cancer in the spine was secondary, the hunt began for the primary and subsequent CT scans showed it to be a twice kidney sized tumour on my left kidney, which unbelievably had possibly been growing there for years! Anyway, following a frustration filled few weeks, full of uncertainties, muddied by a very nasty chest infection, a couple of stays in hospital and a biopsy, we arrived at Guildford Cancer Centre for an appointment with a Dr Michael hoping for the best, but a little fearful of the worst. And here I am with advanced renal cell cancer on a treatment called Pazopanib, a type of treatment called a tyrosine kinase inhibitor (TKI), which blocks the proteins (kinases) from sending signals to the cancer cells to grow and causing them to die - it says here in the pamphlet – so that the tumour will shrink or at least stop growing.

Anyway, why am I boring you with all this doom and gloom you may ask, well, all I want to do is to impress on you; How many times do you hear, 'You never know what's round the corner, make the most of life!' Now, what more proof do you want than me, certainly never had a clue what was round my corner, so please, take note, live life to the full, make sure you do everything you'd like to do without a worry or hesitation, book that luxury cruise now, splash out on that 75" HD LED television you've always fancied, the wish list goes on!

Concluding my little tale, Coral and I would like to thank you for all the many messages we've received, emails, letters, cards and even some prayers offered and although it may have been some time since I went to church, I thank you, I'll take anything which could help. Unlike Southampton FC, I'm not going down yet!

There is

Well locally The Gazette was celebrating its centenary, so it clearly has a head start on the Chronicle. In the wider world The Hitchhikers Guide to the Galaxy was first broadcast on Radio 4, though I listened to it on BBC World Service as I was working in Rome at that time. It was also the year Freddie Laker was knighted for his SkyTrain.

It was a good year for strikes with many notable ones, including Ford (closing 23 sites across the UK), The Times newspaper (which was closed for over a year) and Bakers (causing bread rationing in many areas).

There were many British films released in 1978 including:

Selwyn Lloyd, politician
Keith Moon, drummer with The Who
Harold Abrahams athlete, Olympic Champion at 100 metres in 1924, and l
